# "Where two or three come together in my name..."

16<sup>th</sup> March

Last week when preaching, there was a verse I skipped over - time didn't allow me to say anything about it at all. It's probably one you've heard Christians quote many times – "where two or three come together in my name, there am I with them." – Matthew 18:20.

Several points seem to be implied by Jesus' words.

- It is a striking claim to divinity God alone can be in more places than one at the same time, and always present with His people.
- That to stay at home and fail to assemble for public worship is to miss out on the special meeting of Christ with his people a strong incentive to be present!
- Most often I hear this verse referred to when only a small number have turned up at a prayer meeting or church event. It's a consolation and encouragement for us that although we're small in number, Jesus, the King of kings, is nevertheless present, and the seeming feebleness of our numbers belies the true nature of what is happening! I've almost certainly used the verse to make this point myself!

Does Jesus intend to make all of these points? I wonder whether we have a case of 'right doctrine, wrong passage' here. It is certainly true – we know it from other teachings of Jesus – that he is present with the individual believer, and specially with his gathered church (e.g. Matthew 28:20 "And surely I am with you always, even to the very end of the age"; John 14:18 "I will not leave you as orphans; I will come to you").

I'll admit that verses 18-20 are not straightforward to understand. But in the context of Matthew 18, the gathering of two or three has already been mentioned just four verses earlier: "16 But if they will not listen, take one or two others along, so that 'every matter may be established by the testimony of two or three witnesses." This verse concerns the process for confronting a brother or sister who has sinned against another member of the church fellowship, so that they may confess and repent of their sin and the damaged relationship may be restored. The footnote in our Bible points us to Deuteronomy 19:15, which confirms the idea that the 'two or three' in view are witnesses – not (in this instance) to the initial sin, but to how the process of reconciliation goes.

That suggests that verses 19 and 20 are about the agreement of witnesses in a situation where one brother or sister in the church has wounded another. The presence of Jesus with them ratifies the matter. In the words of the bible scholar Don Carson "his [Jesus'] point in this context is that heaven is in accord (v.19) with believers who follow his instructions regarding church discipline" which some sinful action by one believer against another has necessitated.

Or to put it positively in the words of another writer, "Jesus is saying that whenever the church is pursuing and is involved in a reconciliation process with someone who has refused to repent, they can rest assured that God's blessing is with them in their efforts." Does this mean that Jesus isn't present when a few believers gather to pray? No.

But it does mean that we (and especially I!) should read carefully – which very often means reading the verse in its context, not in isolation.

May we all grow in our ability to correctly handle the word of truth (2 Timothy 2:15)! Peter
